

Making a Significant Impact

In a recent conversation I had with a friend of Texas Boys Ranch, the gentleman mentioned a vacation cottage his family owns in the mountains. He talked about the work he and his wife put into it over the years, how much fun the kids had when they were young, and the memories they all have of the good times spent there. But, as is so often the case, the cabin just doesn't get much use any more. The kids have grown up and are busy with their own families. The older couple finds it more difficult to make the long trek and to keep the place up like they need to. And there's the ever increasing cost of maintaining the property. *What to do?*

The couple could sell the vacation home but would likely have a significant tax bill to pay. They could leave it in their will for a child. But which one? And what about upkeep and property taxes until then? Now, here's an idea that may provide multiple layers of benefits and blessings: they could gift the property to the Texas Boys Ranch Foundation and in exchange receive a life-long income.

By way of example, let's suppose the couple is in their mid-70s, the vacation cottage today is worth \$100,000, and their cost basis in the property is about \$25,000. If this couple were to establish a charitable gift annuity, funded with this "non-producing asset," they would receive a healthy tax deduction this year of about \$38,000, and receive income for life of over \$5000/year. A portion of that income would even be tax-free!

In addition, this couple has the satisfaction of knowing they are making a significant impact not only for children today, but for generations to come through funding the permanent endowment.

With this type of solution, the couple, who love the mission of the Boys Ranch and are proud to be partners in the work, can make a sizeable gift to ensure the care of wounded children will continue well beyond their own lifetimes. As a bonus, they are able to take an asset that may feel more like a burden and a liability and turn it into an income

A TIME OF HARVEST

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Fall and winter on the South Plains brings colder weather, school, football, and all the busyness anyone can imagine; but there is one other thing that comes with this season that must not be overlooked: Harvest.

Growing up as the son of a cotton farmer, the concept of harvest has always filled me with a variety of emotions. Harvest is the time when a farmer gets to see all the fruits of his hard work. It is the culmination of an entire year of work and there seems to be a kind of eagerness present during this season that is difficult to describe. The anticipation surrounding the harvest season is unique to the farmer because his livelihood hangs so precariously in the balance. The only way that I can begin to describe the concept of the harvest is to say that it contains a rich combination of hope and faith.

We were always hopeful for what the harvest could mean for our family, yet we were reminded that our every hope ultimately rested within the sovereign hands of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. It's true, my life no longer directly depends on growing cotton, but this harvest season reminds me that my mission to serve the children at Texas Boys Ranch must be imbued with those same spiritual qualities of Hope and Faith.

Luke teaches us that our hearts are like different kinds of soil, and that receptivity to the gospel depends on the readiness of that soil. For some, the heart is like a heavily traveled path, when the soil of the heart is so hard that the seed can't even take root at that moment. Sometimes, the hearts of the children here at Texas Boys Ranch remind me of this kind of soil.

It is important to remember the reason for the hardening of their hearts. These children have been trampled by so many passersby that they have become conditioned to resist every person they meet. They are resolved to the notion that they are of no real value, except for being a steppingstone for someone else. Without consistent and intentional intervention, these young hearts will continue to believe that.

In order for us to see a harvest of these souls, it is imperative that each of us manifest love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, gentleness, faithfulness, and self-control. We must recognize that these children have been conditioned to resist. If we hope to make a difference in these young lives, we must do the hard work of tilling, watering, and tending.

Each and every time I engage our kids in an activity, I am hopeful for their growth, for their future, and for their eternity. I must never forget that every good and perfect gift comes down from our Heavenly Father. Therefore, if my hope is truly one of eternal implication, the most important work I can do for our children is to be on my knees in prayer. Please join me in that endeavor.

Her corporate experience includes time with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service as Assistant Ag Agent in Lamb County. Mrs. Campbell shares the following with a sense of pride and fulfillment: "Since 2008, I have been a housewife, care-giver and private sitter. In 2016 and 2017, I was the lead coordinator for the setup and decorations of the Tim Tebow Foundation sponsored event, 'A Night to Shine.' In 2018, I coordinated the Red Carpet Team at this event with co-host Kurt Kiser and a fabulous team of volunteers. It was incredible to see the sheer joy in the eyes of each guest as we welcomed them to the event."

Having served on the Texas Boys Ranch Board since 2014, Tricia's introduction to this ministry is extraordinary, to say the least. The following is the account in her own words.

"It was totally inspired by God. It was 2010, and I had been praying about where to serve and what direction God wanted to take me in the coming season. I had a very real dream about children and horses. I woke up and journaled this, but at the time didn't give it much thought. During the day I kept seeing in my mind's eye the vision of a ranch of children. I was compelled to just follow

this prompting in my heart and found the TBR webpage later that day. To me this was an obvious call to search out, so I called and introduced myself to Kyla, who worked for TBR at the time. I started volunteering, but we quickly found we wanted to be sponsors for one of the teenage boys. This was a great experience for us."

The fact that children receive so much more than food and shelter is one reason Tricia is passionate about the TBR mission. "These children have the love and support needed to be overcomers. I can't think of a more noble cause than to share Jesus, restore the broken hearted, and revive hope for those left behind and abandoned."

She considers the compassion of the entire staff, especially those who serve on the front lines and work directly with the children, as a definite strong point of Texas Boys Ranch. Tricia also applauds the organization for adding foster and adoption services several years ago. "Definitely one of the biggest challenges is finding families to foster and adopt these children. The demand for families is a serious need, and the number of children needing care is growing exponentially, outpacing the supply of families available to foster and adopt."

Their children’s minister at the time happened to be a former TBR employee. She introduced them to the folks at Texas Boys Ranch, where they now serve as houseparents to seven boys in Cottage 1. And we must not fail to mention Mily (11) and Craigan (9), their biological children.

Homeschooling Mily and Craigan allows the Giffens to spend quality, one-on-one time with them while the other kiddos are in school. This helps the couple deal with the challenge of giving enough positive attention to their own family while meeting the needs of the other seven. In their eyes, this is a family ministry. Mily and Craigan love having mom and dad at home, but they also enjoy spending time with their cottage family.

Even though serving as houseparents can be challenging, it is filled with wonderful rewards. As he recalled one of the boys giving his life to Christ, Jason finds great fulfillment in “knowing we’re giving them a future.” Danielle enjoys “being able to be there and lead them in the right direction...giving kids a chance.” Both agreed, “We have been called to do this.”

To couples who may consider beginning the foster care process, Danielle states, “It’s hard, but so worth it. Be committed. You need a good support system.” They applaud and appreciate the support they receive from the staff at Texas Boys Ranch. And TBR appreciates the Giffens’ compassion and commitment to making a difference in the lives of children.
