FROM THE PRESIDENT





One of my earliest memories is of my parents and siblings sitting at the kitchen table eating a meal together. Yes! We ate nearly every meal together at the kitchen table...breakfast, dinner, and supper. (I don't exactly know when dinner became lunch and supper became dinner.) I have shared in the past that my family was pretty poor. I didn't really know we were poor, probably because most of our extended family members were also poor. In spite of not having much in the form of possessions, we always had plenty to eat. No one in my family ever went hungry, except me. I would like to say that this is true because I'm the youngest and by the time the platter made it to me, all the food was gone. Sadly, this is not the case. The truth is, I was a picky eater and refused anything I didn't like, which included almost all vegetables. In fact, I remember making the perfectly logical argument that I shouldn't have to work in our rather large family garden because I didn't eat many of the vegetables. I think my parents showed how impressed they were with my sound reasoning by multiplying my chores. So unfair!

Our family meals were an adventure. Someone always prayed over the food before we began, then all the excitement that a family of seven could generate would begin. Multiple conversations would break out as soon as the "amen" was echoed around the table. Our parents would ask questions about our day... school, friends, homework. My siblings and I would have conversations and arguments about everything under the sun. It was total chaos...and my family loved every messy moment around the kitchen table.

How about you? What was your childhood experience around the family table? Did you share a meal around

the kitchen table or did you grab your food and run to the living room to watch television?

I am pleased to share that our cottages and our shelter enjoy almost every meal together at a much larger kitchen table. "Organized Chaos" is probably the best way to describe life in a cottage, especially when preparing and eating meals as a family unit. I know most of our foster homes prefer a family meal around the kitchen table. Sadly, the number of families eating the evening meal together has dropped by 32% in the last 30 years.

I would like to encourage you to Google and read the article, "The Benefits of the Family Table", (American College of Pediatricians – February 2021) to appreciate what families have instinctively known for generations. And to see what happens when we stop this time-honored tradition.

Family meals around the kitchen table make a lasting difference for everyone in the family.

Our first fund appeal each year is an attempt to raise enough money to cover food and housekeeping costs for the year. Your generous donation now allows us to focus on the many other challenges that must be taken care of throughout the year. Can we count on you to help this year?

Then, we sit inside our warm homes or places of business and we do not give a second thought to the cold (except for the noise of the blustery wind that reminds us). We go about our day in comfort and focus our energy things of greater importance. Many of the children and youth we serve have come from families facing hard times made worse by poor decisions. With those circumstances, it is not uncommon for them to experience homes where utility services have been suspended, or worse, they have experienced exposure to the elements without a place to stay. If we wanted to talk psychology, and Maslow's hierarchy of needs, we might talk about how meeting basic needs is necessary before even considering what is going on inside the tender hearts and minds of these precious children.

In times of need, we at Texas Girls & Boys Ranch are heartened by the efforts of our partners in the community who rally around the important work we do and never cease to go the extra mile when it comes to helping hurting children. Our previous appeal outlined some of the struggles we have faced over the last year and we want you to know that even in light of those struggles, we have no intention of slowing down.



In 2024, we are more determined than ever to ensure that every child who needs help in, and even outside, our area can benefit from our services whenever possible.

As you know, a trip to the grocery store can be quite a shock to the pocketbook these days. As we head into the new year food budgeting is one of the most challenging aspects of our planning for the future. It is no small task to feed hundreds of children every year. This is one area where we could really use your help.

In fact, there are many ways you can help out with our campaign to feed the children in 2024.

Things like using social media to spread the word and help raise funds. Asking your church or employer to conduct a drive to collect food items. But one of the most beneficial things you could consider doing is making a donation, and not just a one-time donation, but a recurring donation that would ensure there are funds available on a regular and continuing basis for feeding the precious children we serve. I can't think of a more heartwarming and generous gift than that.

If you think about it, all of the things listed above take very little effort.

I could tell dozens of stories about how your caring endeavors impact the lives of the children at the Ranch, but one in particular comes to mind because it took place very recently. Javier is eleven years old and has been at the Ranch for only a couple of months. Javier lives with a houseparent couple who are Hispanic and they have the whole cottage making tamales during the holidays. This was Javier's first experience with this





cottage tradition but he worked at it like a pro. The houseparents noticed at one point that he was crying. When they took him aside to ask if he was okay, he related to them that his family used to get together and make tamales at his grandparent's house but his grandparents had both passed away and the tradition was lost as his family slowly fell apart around him. He thought he would never make tamales again. As soon as there was time, Javier's houseparents took him to the cemetery where his grandparents are buried. He hadn't been there since their funerals. This may seem like a sad story but it actually is a very happy one. You see, Javier may not have a traditional family but his family does have traditions and he is encouraged to continue those traditions and to be proud of his heritage.

As you can see from Javier's story, food is often about much more than nutrition. Yes, nutrition is very important, but the traditions, the fellowship, and the sharing that come from a special meal is something that can change lives. That is what we want for the children at the Ranch. We want them to feel secure that they will always have the nutrition they need but more than that, we want them to have all the fellowship and comfort that comes from sharing meals around a family table.

We want the children at the Ranch not just to have full bellies, but full and fruitful lives as well.

Won't you help us give them that? All it takes is for you to send in the provided card or to go online. And don't forget to consider making your donation recurring as the need is an ongoing one. You can really make a difference in the life of a child today and throughout the whole year.

One of our favorite holiday traditions is the Overton Hotel & Conference Center's annual gingerbread display. Lubbock's Largest Gingerbread Display is open to the public and can be viewed through December 31st each year.

2023 marked the 12th year for the tradition and the Overton culinary team put in countless hours to bring the design to life using hundreds of pounds of gingerbread, icing, and candies to complete the design. The hotel is decorated so beautifully at Christmastime and the gingerbread display brings home all the festive atmosphere of the holidays.

In addition to the display, Overton General Manager Kurt Metcalf and Director of Sales and Marketing Shannon Baker invited our children and houseparents to be their guests at a special Christmas dinner. They were treated to a fancy meal and then got a sneak peek at the gingerbread display before its big public reveal.

The gingerbread project is unique and reflects the Overton Hotel & Conference Center's dedicated partnership with Texas Girls & Boys Ranch. Since the beginning, the holiday project has raised tens of thousands of dollars to benefit the children at the Ranch. Donations can be made at the Overton Hotel's front desk by purchasing a \$5 ornament or a donation of any amount.
