What a year! There are only two months left in the school year and summer is right around the corner. Very soon our boys and girls will be busy with lots of activities to fill the weeks before school starts again. We never allow summer to end without at least one week at a Church Camp. It's hard to imagine just how much difference a week can make for shy and withdrawn girls and boys, especially children who have been abused and neglected by so many important people in their lives. According to Dr. Michael Popkin, founder of Active Parenting Publishers, "The building blocks of self-esteem are belonging, learning, and contributing." Church Camp offers unique opportunities for children to succeed in these three vital areas, even more than what they experience at home and in school. Hundreds of youth ministers and experts in child development agree that church and leadership camps make a profound difference in the lives of children and youth.

But we don't have to listen to the experts about the value of Church Camp. We have personal testimony from our kids from over the years who have described their camp experiences:

Jennifer (age 12): *"I learned how to be on my own without someone with me all the time."*

Michael (age 17): "I feel that I am better at interacting with friends and even my family. The skills learned at camp helped me a lot when I went back to the Ranch."

Susan (age 9): "I learned about God as my father and Jesus as my big brother!"

Kelly (age 9): "I learned how to be responsible and respectful."

LaToya (age 8): "I cried when I had to leave my new friends."

Randall (age 12): "I learned to have fun, be a leader, and most of all – about God."

Our children reap multiple benefits from a one-week camp experience. They think they are there to have fun and they WILL have fun. But so much more is going on than they realize. The benefits of camp are both immediate and slow to emerge. Most importantly, although the experience itself is brief, the impact of that experience can last a lifetime...can even make an eternal difference.

For many children who have been victimized by abuse and neglect, camp is the one place where they can feel accepted without labels. After all, the other kids aren't with their parents either, so for just a little while they can imagine what it feels like to be "normal". Won't you reach into your wallet, grab a checkbook, or pull out your credit card to help send our children to camp this year? Our kids will be glad you did...so will their house parents.

And I think you will also!

Benjamin (Ben) arrived on campus on April 19th of 2021. He came to live in cottage two with Evan & Twyla Williams. Ben has been at TxGBR the longest of our current twenty-five kids on campus. He has grown so much over those three years, and this will be a hard one to see graduate. With the right amount of nurturing, love, redirecting, and structure, Ben has adjusted into a more mature young man than when he first arrived. Ben is looking at attending a trade school to learn welding or IT. We are excited to see Ben finish his senior year and continue into adulthood.



Maisy arrived on our campus on May 23 of 2023 with her three other siblings. Maisy is the oldest and had to raise her younger three siblings at a young age. Before coming into care, Maisy was working jobs to provide for her siblings while trying to maintain her credits to stay current in school. At one point, Maisy and her siblings were camping out because they had nowhere to live. Right now, Maisy is the 4th in her class at Roosevelt High School and is applying to Texas Tech University to attend in the fall. Maisy is interested in pursuing a career as a pharmacist. She has maintained a job since last fall and has saved up all her checks in hopes of purchasing a used car so she can use it for college. When Maisy first arrived, she made a comment that she was grateful to just have a bed to sleep on. We are excited to see Maisy achieve goals despite her hardships.

road runner makes his rounds by our main offices most mornings. God has blessed the Ranch with a beautiful campus and the ability to get the kids out into nature.



We find tremendous value in providing the kids opportunities to be in and around nature. From our year-round horse program which includes trail rides, and Equine Assisted Psychotherapy, to our periodic fishing trips in Mason, Tx, and around the Cisco, TX area, we look for opportunities where kids can experience what God has made for their/our enjoyment.

One outdoor opportunity immediately on our main campus is our outdoor classroom and nature trail. The brainchild of one of our board members, this project was realized in 2022. It consists of a fire pit, an outdoor stage, benches, bench swings, picnic tables, and several trails. It provides locations to sit and enjoy a colorful, West Texas sunset, several isolated (yet visible) areas to sit in solitude, and some varied terrain to go for a quiet jog.





We have hopes of further developing this complex in the future but even if those plans do not materialize for several years, it has already been identified by some of our youth as their favorite outdoor area on the campus. For the ability to appreciate God's creation and the opportunity it allows some youth to deepen that connection, the area's value cannot be calculated.

The Turning Point contract has been signed and fully executed with Superior Health Plan. In addition, Childcare Licensing has given the green light for the TxGBR Children's Shelter to begin accepting qualified Turning Point clients. We have multiple direct care staff, including three new staff members who have worked hard "knocking out" all minimum standards

training requirements. In addition, we re accepting applications for additional Direct Care Staff and well as House Manager and Cook positions. The team will participate in a specialized training called EQ2. This training will take place in the next couple of weeks. The training is designed to increase the staff's own self-regulation skills and will equip them to manage conflicts that may arise. In addition, it will increase staff understanding of trauma and the impact of trauma on the youths' behavior and development. We are excited and ready to accept our first client at Turning Point!

There are times we have families apply to our Foster Care Program because they are caring for their grandchildren or nieces and nephews. Whenever Child Protective Services makes a determination that it is not safe for a child to stay with their biological parents, they first ask about family members who might take the child(ren) in. As you can imagine, this could

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potentially become a significant burden, financially and in other ways, for those family members, especially if they already have children of their own. That is why it is recommended that these families get licensed through an agency like ours so they can receive training, emotional support, financial reimbursement, and help navigating the system. These kinship foster families are special to us because they are going above and beyond to care for their own family members. It is hard to take on those added responsibilities while also following so many rules and expectations. We really appreciate our kinship families and are always here to help.



When you think about it, the cost of Church Camp is a very small price to pay for such a potentially life-changing experience.

Performance Quality Improvement (PQI)



TIME FOR A CHECKUP

How often do you go in for a checkup?

The answer probably depends on exactly what we're talking about. Most of us have a schedule for taking care of those things that are important in our lives. You take your car to the mechanic every so many miles to change fluids and get a tune up so it will continue to serve you well. Asset Protection for Loved Ones: We live in a litigious society. Does your current plan protect your beneficiaries from lawsuits and creditors? A well-crafted plan can protect their inheritance.

Privacy Upon Death: Your last will and testament will be filed in the public records in your county. The law also requires an inventory be published of all your assets and their values. A well drafted estate plan can give you the ability to have your estate administered privately.

Minimize Taxes: Retirement accounts need special planning to minimize the impact of taxes on your loved ones. Tax law changes in recent years have particular implications in this area. Will your heirs receive a tax burden in addition to the assets you leave them?
